

"A systematic review of constructive and solutions journalism research"

We carried out a systematic review of 94 peer-reviewed journal publications, theses and dissertations, 2011-2020, that had solutions journalism and/or constructive journalism as a focus.

In short, we see the need for:

- 1) further internationalization, especially outside of US and Western Europe contexts
- 2) clear distinction in definitions of the two approaches
- 3) much more attention to theoretical/conceptual approaches and theory-building

Key finding: Bulk of the current focus is in the US and western Europe.

Our recommendation: Support further internationalization, including comparative studies. We included non-English publications but more can be done to address the English-language barrier of science.

Key finding: While solutions journalism is often placed under the umbrella of constructive journalism, the two are also frequently conflated.

Our recommendation: Alleviate confusion by sticking to the umbrella definition and highlight the distinctions between the two practices.

Key finding: A great mix of qualitative and quantitative methodological approaches

Our recommendation: We see room for more specific studies that look at news topics or news processes, as well as more theoretical/conceptual approaches.

Key finding: No clear front-runner in theoretical constructs, and often more of a theory review than theory testing/incorporation

Our recommendation: We need more theory-building and conceptual work. Peter Bro's Journalistic Compass framework offers a useful start.

We also list out all the journals that have published papers on constructive and/or solutions journalism, so if you're looking for a place to submit here is a great list!
